
No School for Students on Wednesday, January 31, For Report Card / Semester Turn Around Day

Bussing Back-Up Plan

It is important to develop a backup plan, in the event your child's bus does not pick them up or is late, especially in the event of stormy or cold weather. If parents are not at home, does your child have access to their home and would they know who to call? Is there a neighbor at home to help them out if need be? Please take some time to put a plan in place and share it with your child/children.

Chinook City Schools Severe Weather Policy



In the event of extreme cold temperatures, or adverse road conditions, it may be necessary to cancel bussing. The **Swift Current City School busses** will not run when the morning when the *temperature is –40 degrees Celsius, or when the wind chill is –45 degrees below, based on Environment Canada*).

Bus cancellations will be communicated to parents, by the school division, using the **School Messenger** system. We also encourage you to keep an eye on the weather conditions for the potential of bus cancellations during the day, where you might have to pick up your child after school.

In the event of division wide bus cancellations, Chinook will announce this information using the local radio stations also,. Please note <u>only</u> the busses will be cancelled, **city schools will remain open**, including the Comp High School. Parents always have the right to keep their children home during severe weather conditions, if they feel their child's safety may be in jeopardy.

Perseverance Overview

This month is all about Perseverance. One way to think about Perseverance is "pushing yourself through challenges and obstacles." We all experience challenges in our lives. 1. What do you feel you bring to the Board table as a trustee? I feel I bring a willingness to listen and a strong understanding of governance, in part due to my own personal career. Plus, I have gained valuable knowledge of Chinook School Division, what the challenges are and what the successes have been since being on the board.

2. What do you feel is one of the most important issues facing rural education today? I feel that one of the most important issues facing education today is student well-being. Because there is more than one important issue, I also want to comment on the financial challenges the school division faces as a result of not being adequately funded by the provincial government. Without sufficient funding, it is very difficult to tackle the issues.

3. Which of Chinook School Division's VALUES is most important to you and why? (Care, Commitment, Integrity, Respect, Trust, Empathy, Excellence, Loyalty, Honesty) This is a very difficult question to answer as all our values are so crucial for a school division to have, so I will focus on two of them. To <u>Care</u>, you must be dedicated to students and staff, supporting programming and their needs. This is necessary for the health, welfare, and protection of students and their families, staff and the division as a whole. <u>Integrity</u> is crucial as it requires honesty, reliability and strong moral principles, while respecting the feelings, wishes and traditions of students, families and staff.

4. What do you think needs to happen in the Education sector to ensure a bright future for students in southwest Saskatchewan?

Students need to have their social, emotional and physical needs met. They need to be given the opportunity to form long lasting relationships among both their peers and students of other ages as well as teachers and other staff while being educated. This allows students to grow and learn, to discover their passions, to problem solve things that they will face in life, to develop social and emotional skills and to develop skills to work together or to work independently. Students need to be encouraged to implement critical thinking and problem solving. This is a lifelong skill that is needed.

5. What is your most memorable school event or activity you have been a part of?

Another tough question as there are many to choose from! If I was to choose just one, I would pick the Welcome Back Muffin morning at École Centennial School. It was so much fun to experience the level of energy and excitement there was from students and staff as families had a muffin with coffee/juice together while seeing their new classrooms for the year.
